### **PASTOR'S CORNER - Why are We Late to Church?**

First and foremost, I must declare that Shafter does not have this problem. But it is something which we should be conscious of in order to ensure that it does not become one. And, truly, I appreciate the love and faithfulness you exhibit week after week. Blessings!!!

To sum up last week's message we should realize that our timeliness sends a message about our attitude regarding the importance of worship service. One's **un**willingness to be on time says that the first part of the service is not important and skipping the early welcoming/greeting time is also not important. When one consistently shows up late, they're treating Sunday morning as an individualistic spectator event rather than as a corporate, participatory gathering of God's people.

Embodied presence (being here physically and mentally/spiritually) is necessary for us to worship corporately. The church's singing, praying, and preaching depend on the congregation being present to participate. These are the primary reasons we need to gather rather than just worshiping God on our own **in private**. Embodied presence requires that we gather intentionally rather than just eventually show up.

A time to gather has been established and we are not just meeting together but we are meeting together with God. Jesus tells us in **Mtt 18:20** that when 2 or 3 gather, so does He. We have a specific time to meet with each other and with the God of all creation. Unfortunately, it's often the case that some members keep God and our congregation waiting.

If we believe the service is primarily about what we can get out of it—uplifting music, an encouraging sermon, fellowship with friends—then arriving late makes sense. After all, we can still catch most of the "good stuff." But if you understand corporate worship as something we do together as the body of Christ—if you see it as our collective offering of praise to our Creator — then showing up late, or even barely on time, takes on a different meaning entirely. We're not just showing up late; we're missing the opportunity to fully participate in something the Lord has designed in order to form us as His people. When we treat the opening songs as optional warm-up acts, we're misunderstanding their purpose. These aren't entertainment to help us transition into a "spiritual mood." They're our corporate declaration of God's worth; our unified voice lifted in praise. Every voice and presence matters.

And none of this speaks to the effect that arriving late may have on our visitors and newcomers. What are we teaching them about our priorities; about the importance we place on corporate worship; about our respect for one another and for God???

The God of the universe has scheduled time for His family to meet together each and every Sunday. The least we can do is show up on time. And blessedly, you all are so conscientious about this. If the Spirit was to send a letter to us (as found in Revelations), this would be one of our **commendations**. Thank you for being such good examples for other Christians to emulate!!! ©

#### You were hardwired to depend on God, so your dreams of self-reliance And self-sufficiency will prove to be more nightmares than dreams.

Why is it so hard for so many of us to ask for help? Why is it so difficult for us to admit that we don't know things? Why do we attempt to do things that we've never done before without seeking instruction? Why is it so hard for us to admit that we can't make it on our own? Why do we struggle to own our weakness and our ignorance? Why do children resist the instruction of their parents? Why do workers hate to be told what to do by their bosses? Why do we not like to ask for directions? Why do we work so hard to present ourselves as more ready, knowledgeable, and capable than we really are? Why do we often push people away when they are offering assistance? Why do we tell people that we're okay when we're not? Why do we act as if we can solve things that we don't really understand? Why do we hesitate to get the advice of the doctor, the counselor, or the wise friend? Why do we allow independence to trouble our trouble? Why?

The answer seems too straightforward and simplistic, but it is the answer nonetheless. The answer to every one of the questions above is *sin*. Self-reliance and self-sufficiency are what sin does to the heart. Hosea 10:13 captures this very powerfully "You have plowed iniquity; you have reaped injustice; you have eaten the fruit of lies. Because you have trusted in your own way and in the multitude of your warriors." Don't miss the cause-and-effect structure of this passage. The prophet essentially asks: "Why have you experienced moral impurity? Why have you endured injustice? Why have you accepted what is not true?" There is only one possible answer to these questions, and it's not the one we want to hear. All of these things happened, the prophet says, because you wanted and trusted your own way and relied upon your own strength.

It is hard to accept, but vital to humbly admit. Bad things happen when we attempt to live as we were not created to live. Sin causes us to deny our need for God and others. Sin causes us to assign to ourselves the wisdom, strength, and righteousness we do not have. Sin causes us to dethrone God and enthrone ourselves. Sin is shockingly proud and self-assured. Sin really does cause us all to fall into the delusion that we can be like God. And because sin does this to all of us, it is dark, deceitful, and dangerous. Self-reliance and self-sufficiency as your fundamental approach to life will never lead to anything good. Sin always leads to death of some kind in some way. So we need to be rescued from our quest for independence and brought into relationship with the One who really does have everything we need. And that's exactly what the grace of Jesus does for us!
